Fourth Grade Frolics

Hello Guardians,

We are beginning a new module, our class will build their knowledge about protecting the planet, with a focus on the persuasive text genre. We will read texts and view videos about what people can do to take care of our planet. Children will also write a speech for an imaginary school council meeting.

Homework Reminder:

- Students are responsible for reading 20 minutes per night, 5 times a week. With the typical fourth grade reader averaging 100 words per minute, this equates to approximately 10,000 words per week.
- Students will use their nightly reading to help them complete A.R. quizzes at school. Time is given in the morning, during acceleration time, in the afternoon, and when they finish independent work early. <u>A.R. quizzes do not count if they are</u> <u>done outside of class.</u>
- Students will receive a monthly reading fluency grade based on the number of words they read each week according to the A.R. program. This scale is available on classdojo. The goal for 90% (A) is 40,000 words.

Return to Learn/Return to Play (Concussion Policy)

Under a new Nevada law (Senate Bill 80), effective July 1, 2024, students who have a head injury, such as a concussion, will be screened with a Return To Learn Protocol. As part of the Return to Learn Protocol, students who continue to experience symptoms as a result of the head injury may require additional assistance with their educational needs and will be referred to the school's Section 504 Liaison for consideration of a 504 Plan to assist them during their recovery. Research shows that parents can have a powerful impact on their childrens' mindsets. Research on praise and mindsets shows that when we praise children for being smart, it promotes a fixed mindset. It sends a message that their accomplishments are trait-based, and tied to something innate. In contrast, praising kids for working hard promotes a growth mindset. It sends a message that the child's effort is what led them to success. Want more tips on what to say, and what not to say, when praising your kids? Say This, Not That!

Say This	Not That
"I can see you worked so hard on this!"	"You are so smart!"
"It seems like it's time to try a new strategy."	"It's okay. Maybe you're just not cut out for this!"
"I like watching you do that."	"You're a natural at that!"
"It looks like that was too easy for you. Let's find you something challenging so your brain can grow."	"That's right! You did that so quickly and easily; great job!"
"That's not right. You don't understand this yet. What strategies can you try to understand it better?"	"That's not right. Are you paying attention in class? It seems like you're not even trying."
"That was really hard. Your effort has paid off! Next time you'll be ready for this kind of challenge!"	"That was really hard. I'm so glad it's over and you don't have to do that again."

Writing: Students are working on writing RACES responses to informational text in order to improve their ability to analyze and respond to texts effectively. By using the RACES strategy, students are learning how to construct well-supported answers, cite evidence from the text, and provide clear explanations. This process not only helps students engage with the material more deeply but also strengthens their writing and critical thinking skills, ensuring they can communicate their understanding in a structured and organized way.

Math: This month, our students are diving into the world of measurement! We are exploring both the metric and customary systems, learning how to convert between units, and applying these skills to real-world scenarios. Please encourage your child to practice measuring objects at home using rulers, measuring cups, and scales to reinforce what they are learning in class.

Social Studies: March is Women's History Month, and we celebrated by learning about influential women who have made a lasting impact on history. Students are researching pioneers in science, politics, civil rights, and more. Ask your child about the women they are studying and how their contributions have shaped our world today.
